Dear Peter,

Knowing that you are again playing the Euphonium makes your absence from home easier for us to bear. Hope that the book arrived safely. It was good to get your letter!

There is a logical explanation for the state of this notepaper. Ian and Rosemary visited us the week-end before last. In a burst of brotherly love, Graeme decided to wash Ian's car - to see if it was the same one he was driving last time we saw him. In removing the accumulation of twelve months dirt, Graeme managed to get some water in the boot. Also in the boot was Ian's Renault handbook. To prevent the shiny pages from drying into a solid block, your aging father ironed the pages dry between sheets of note-paper. It was a very successful operation apart from the fact that I can only find ironed notepaper to write this on.

I thought that you might like the full explanation in case you got the impression that our financial position was such that we were reduced to washing and re-using the paper from letters received. It has been a good year - quite embarrassingly so from a business point of view - in fact so good that we are able to afford an Australian holiday this year instead of heading for overseas places with lower standards of living.

We fly up to Cairns on 30<sup>th</sup> June, leaving Melbourne at 7 AM. We should pass over Emerald about 10 AM, and will look out for you. If your desk is near the window, and if you have a clean hanky, please wave so that we know it is you. We will be staying at the Ithaca Villa Motel until the afternoon of 10<sup>th</sup> July, then flying a reciprocal course back home. We have our tickets and accommodation, but beyond that have no firm plans. We will probably hire a car and see something of the Tablelands and surrounding places, as well as Green Island. We have a hired singer at the moment, but will probably dump it at Tullamarine on the way.

The weather here at the moment is an invigorating 6° overnight, rising to about 12° in the heat of the day - although snow is predicted & and

I think that a cold snap is probably on the way. We are hoping that bairns may be a little different.

I think that I mentioned to you on the phone the reason for us driving a Sigma at present. The Peugeot is slowly recovering, and we hope that it will resume its old familiar shape before we leave. We were clobbered by a Monaro in Thompson's road on the Saturday night that Ian & Rosemary were visiting. Fortunately they were not with us, but we received the best of attention when we got home. We were hit in the rear quarter, just aft of the passenger side back door, and spun around. I think that a lesser car would probably have tipped, however the protection fore and aft did not work too well sideways. Mum hit her head on the door pillar, and I got tangled up in the seat belt buckles - nothing serious. Mum has a bit of back-lash, which seems to be clearing up, and I collected a few bruises around the ribs. The worst part for me was that I had a bit of a cold last week and the sneezes brought tears to my eyes. It also hurt to laugh, but, being of a serious-minded nature, that was no handicap. We both went to Dr Heeds in the following weeks - only really to establish that there had been some injury, in case there were legal proceedings later. He gave me a limited life to live - about 45 years. Mum also came through with flying colours.

I may have mentioned an interest in film-making, which those with suspicious minds might interpret as an interest in evasion tax. The agreements, through the partnership, contain guarantees from people like Warner Bros. that there will be sufficient profitability in the企back to at least meet recoupment of capital in 5 years time, so I might even get the money back and make a profit - but as I said before, that does not matter as long as the tax is saved.

Mum got a card from them on her birthday, but we have heard nothing further from them. The kids are of course with them, and <sup>they</sup> should all be back in sunny Melbourne for Sunday night's train.

Rhonda and Ed. incidentally, have sold their Metung house at a good profit, and bought another in Metung. They plan to do this one up, put on a second storey, and sell it, then repeat the exercise ad infinitum until the tax-man starts knocking on their door.

Mum is out tonight with the girls over at Auntie June's  
Hartley's place in Glen Waverley? Monday night is now a regular  
outing to Lower Templestowe and an art class. Mum only. I have absolutely  
no hidden or latent talent in that direction, but mum seems to be  
enjoying it immensely, which is good.

Rosemary and Jan were down a couple of weeks ago for Rosemary's  
interview at the Mercy. She was accepted, and starts in August. Jan  
of course will be there too.

I have now put electric power on in the glass house and have  
some tomatoes and other things growing out of season, protected from  
the weather. Last week-end I planted out four boxes of pansies - also  
still in the glasshouse, so that we can have instant flowers in early  
spring.

I started this letter with good intentions, but have since weakened  
and have the T.V. on now with the night football - played every

When I last wrote, whenever that was, I mentioned that we had
