There is a bit of a worry that both Kerin and the new deputy leader of the labour party - Howe - are both from the left wing of the party and may not be tough enough in cutting back government spending. The farmers are not too happy that Bill Keltie (former head of the ACTU) has been made agriculture minister. The farmers and the unions don't seem to have much in common. Hawke himself has been under pressure from the centre left of his own party which accuses him of handling the truth very carelessly on a couple of occasions. Without Keating as his minder, Hawke has been far less than impressive. All very destabilizing. Our <sup>FT</sup> weathered to around 75c U.S. The share market also re-acted unfavourably to the leadership uncertainties.
